## NASCAR's new setup helps Californians

acific Coast Region competition is more appealing to geography majors this season because it is an all-California contest.


NASCAR has taken two Missouri tracks, one from Oregon and one from Washington, out of its Pacific Coast Region and replaced them with Sun Belt Region speedways while expanding from eight to 10 ovals.

Californians will compete at Altamont, Antioch, Cajon (El Cajon), Madera, Mesa Marin (Bakersfield), Orange Show (San Bernardino), San Jose, Shasta (Anderson), Stockton and Watsonville for points and a chance at the national championship.

Under the new alignment, the Californians aren't competing against Larry Phillips, who dominated the Missouri ovals, and Greg Biffle, who starred at Portland and Richland, Wash., last season to dominate the Pacific Coast Region.

The Missouri tracks have been assigned to the Heartland Region and the Pacific Northwest speedways are placed in the Great West Region.

Without Phillips, the eventual national champion, and Biffle scoring points in less-competitive situations, last year's Pacific Coast Regional leaders under the current setup would have been Dave Byrd
