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## Racers roarin' to go in Trans-Am finale

The horses are loose and blazing around the Reno Hilton.

Three races have been decided, with three remaining in the Reno Grand Prix — including today's main event, the season-ending SCCA Trans-Am competition.

The 640-horsepower Trans-Ams are capable of reaching 170 mph down the main straightaway on the temporary track set up in the Hilton's parking lot. Expect every bit of that power to be on display when the 75-lap race begins at 1:30 p.m.

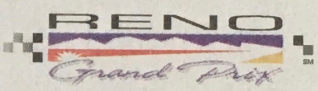
Paul Gentilozzi has the pole, with Dorsey Schroeder alongside.

"Traffic will be a problem on the re-starts and at the start of the race — at least for a lap or two," Schroeder said. "I don't mind at all

driving sideways. It gives me the ability to run hard the whole time." Tommy Kendall, starting from

the fourth position, wants to get back on the winners' podium. He had his 11-race victory streak bro-



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ken in late September by Rookie of the Year Mike Borkowski.

"You've got to hope guys in front make mistakes," he said. "Hopefully I can force some mistakes."

In Saturday's races, Jeff Glenn

took the American City Racing League win and clinched the series championship. Rick Lee, owner of Team Reno, ended up fifth.

Greg LeMond, driving for Team Reno, had been optimistic after qualifying 14th in just his second day in the Lola T89.

"I want to have fun but stay out of crashes," he said before the race. "I'm more comfortable pushing the car. I think that's what gives you another second or two (per lap)."

But his car suffered electrical problems and spent much of the race in the pits. He ended up 24th.

In the Spec Racer Ford Pro race, Warren Stillwell won the race and the series title.

In the World Challenge T1 class, Lou Gigliotti was victorious, but second-place Peter Cunningham took the series.
