





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American City Racing League Season Review

Dynamic Decade For American City Racing League by Roger Diez



Jeff Glenn set six fastest-qualifier marks and scored three wins on the way to the American City Racing League SS2000 Drivers Championship.

he American City Racing League closed out its first decade with the 1997 racing season, and what a season it was. Statistically, five different drivers and five teams scored wins in the eight-race series. Two new chassis and two new teams debuted, as the Carbir chassis carried Team Beverly Hills driver Jeff Glenn to victory on three occasions and Craig Simmiss' Shrike took the S2000 victory for North Vancouver B.C. in its only ACRL outing in Vancouver. Glenn added six poles to his three checkered flags to take the Vasser Cup, symbol of the Driving

Championship, while Team Fresno took the team title and the Blackaller Cup.

Peter Zarcades of Las Vegas took his Swift to two victories and two poles, but lost the championship in the 11th hour with a crash in the final race, the Reno Hilton Challenge. Team Reno's Rick Lee won the first race of the season, while two first-time winners mounted the podium—Fresno's Steve Romak at Laguna Seca, and Vancouver BC's Jeff Clegg at his home race in Vancouver. It was the first professional race win for each driver.

The season started at Portland in early May.

Intermittent rain and availability of rain tires were the two big topics. In the end, qualifying and the race were run in dry conditions, and Glenn's Carbir dominated early, taking the pole and motoring away at the green flag. However, a broken CV joint sidelined the Beverly Hills juggernaut, and Lee took the checker, backing up his 1996 season-ending win in Reno. Teammate Gary Hewett added enough points to score the team win for Reno as well.

Next up was the season's only oval race at Mesa Marin in Bakersfield. Zarcades was dominant, setting the fastest qualifying lap of the weekend (including Winston West and Southwest Tour cars), and taking a flag-to-flag victory. Glenn took second with a great restart after a yellow flag, aided by chief engineer Eric Purcell talking him through traffic. Zarcades' teammate Chris Ronson followed Glenn through and his third place scored the Team trophy for Las Vegas. The ACRL put on a fantastic show for the circle track crowd.

Back to Portland for the Rose Cup, Glenn vindicated the Carbir chassis and himself by taking the pole and the win. Behind him, Lee took second and Zarcades stayed in the championship hunt with a strong third place. Rookie of the Year challenger Romak of Team Fresno took his third fourth-place finish, consistent but wanting to run farther up front. Beverly Hills won the team title on the basis of Glenn's victory and Mark Neuhaus' eighth place.

Sears Point was the halfway point of the season and saw Glenn take the pole easily. Zarcades despaired of keeping up, but Glenn joined the "Roberto Guerrero Club" by spinning on the pace lap and then made an illadvised pass attempt on the first lap which finished the race for Lee and Romak. Glenn was black-flagged for a stop-and-go penalty and Zarcades inherited the lead. He made the most of this good fortune, taking the checker to become the first repeat winner of the season. Fresno's John Ostlund took his first podium finish with a second place, while Glenn recovered to finish third, garnering the unofficial title of "Danger Boy." Las Vegas again took the team win, courtesy of Zarcades' first and Ronson's seventh.

Glenn scored his fourth pole in five races at Laguna Seca, but bad luck struck again. A flat tire (the result of running over the pace car's lost radio antenna), cost him the lead when he pitted for fresh rubber. Romak took the point and held it to the checker in convincing fashion, chased home by Zarcades and Ostlund. Glenn finished a distant eighth. Romak and Ostlund secured the team victory for Fresno.

The series returned to the street circuit in Vancouver after a three-year hiatus, running in support of the CART PPG Cup series. Zarcades, who had won three

previous Vancouver outings, used his experience to capture the pole, while Glenn was mired in traffic. The race began in twilight, victim of the Indy Car schedule, and was shortened to 14 laps as darkness descended. Jeff Clegg, running in front of his home Vancouver crowd, made a brilliant "pass of the season" on the first restart and seized the lead from Zarcades. Romak also bulled his way past the Las Vegas driver on the last lap, leaving points leaders Zarcades and Glenn in third and fourth, respectively. Clegg's teammate Bob Thomson's eighth-place finish also secured the team win for the home team.

For the penultimate race of the season, the ACRL visited a new venue, Las Vegas Motor Speedway. The drivers loved the high-speed oval section, and there was much changing of gear ratios after the first practice to optimize top-end speeds. Glenn's Carbir proved to be fastest in qualifying yet again, but only with a last-lap banzai charge to squeak by Romak's fast time. Zarcades challenged early in the race, but fell back to wage a race-long battle with Lee for third place. Romak's charge to second after an early spin was nullified by a mechanical DQ, moving the drivers behind him up one position. Lee's

third and Leo Sismani's sixth scored the team win for Reno.

We must say a word about the Sports 2000 "B" class, the SOHC Ford-powered cars. Frank Arnold of Team Fresno returned to the series after a long hiatus and proved he has lost none of his speed. Arnold took five wins, a second, a third, and a fourth, an even more dominant class record than that of Glenn in the Cosworth category. John Bachofner of Team Wilsonville had a tremendous season to finish second in class, scoring wins in the first and last races of the season. Team San Diego's Ian Wood finished third

in class, with a pair of seconds and four third-place finishes.

The gala ACRL Awards Banquet held at the Reno Hilton was a rousing success. Jeff Glenn jubilantly waved the coveted Vasser Cup in the air as he was presented as the 1997 Drivers Champion. Team Fresno members Romak, Ostlund and Arnold were on hand to celebrate their victory. Romak also won the Rising Star award and Rookie of the Year in the Super Sports 2000 category, while Arnold won the Sports 2000 Drivers Championship and Ostlund took Most Improved Driver. Rookie of the Year in Sports 2000 was Jay

Messenger and the Sportsperson of the Year award recipient was Margie Smith-Haas. The Hard Luck award went to Bob Young, while Doug Esterbrook of Team Wilsonville was voted Mechanic of the Year, and respondents judged Team Beverly Hills to have the Best Car and Team Presentation. An appreciative Dick Templeton, ACRL chief steward, accepted a special 10-Year Service award.

As the American City Racing League enters its second decade of competition, there are exciting possibilities in the works as plans for the 1998 season are developed.
